

VOCATIONAL REHAB PROGRAM

GOODGUIDES YOUTH MENTORING PROGRAM

The GoodGuides program, which began in Springfield in 2009, now has more than 100 youth enrolled with 22 mentors and an active Student-Athlete-Program. The singular focus of the Student-Athlete-Program (SAP) is to help youth graduate high school successfully and to enroll in a college or university of their choice. During 2018, youth in the SAP program learned to become role models in their schools, worked through SAT and ACT prep courses, received guidance in completing FAFSA forms and visited more than 120 colleges and universities. They also participated in numerous basketball tournaments in lowa, Illinois, Indiana and Kentucky winning their fare share of awards and reaching the AYPT National Championship. To date, 39 of the youth that participated in the GoodGuides program are now enrolled in college, with more having directly entered the workforce or military.

CAREER DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Our five Career Centers in Bloomington/Normal, Danville, Jacksonville, Quincy and Springfield help individuals with most every aspect of employment, from how to search for jobs online, how to assess their own skills, preparing resumes, how to interview, even what to wear professionally. In 2018, our outstanding coaches saw and supported more than 700 people in various capacities. The Career Development program also introduced a new partnership with Google.com, the Goodwill Digital

Career Accelerator.[™] This unique program is designed to help individuals gain valuable computer skills to be better prepared to enter the online workforce. Land of Lincoln Goodwill was also only one of 10 Goodwill enterprises in the country to receive a grant to launch the "Skills to Succeed Academy." The Academy, targeted primarily to high school students, is a new online tool that can build employability skills, self-assessments and allows people to work at their own pace using videos, gaming techniques and real life scenarios. To date, our Career Centers have introduced the program to learners at 22 high schools, community colleges and adult education organizations in central Illinois. Vermilion County Inside magazine featured Goodwill's Career Center and the Skills to Succeed Academy Center



Faces of Go

Meet Dylan Prevost, one of the many Faces of Good.



Dylan is wheelchair bound, but his spirit and sense of self worth are the keys to his success. But it wasn't always that way. When his father passed away, Dylan had to relocate from his hometown to be closer to other family members. And he had to find a job. Dylan had not been employed in more than 14 years and was finding it difficult to get on board anywhere. "I had been without employment for 14 years. I had learned some job skills, but I did not have any real job experience," said Dylan. Eventually a friend suggested he look into employment with Land of Lincoln Goodwill. He did just that and in a matter of a few weeks, Dylan landed his first paid job as a donation processor at a Springfield, IL based Goodwill store." Land of Lincoln Goodwill has a special place in my heart," says Dylan. "They gave me an opportunity to live a normal life, not to struggle or cut corners. Goodwill gave me a step-up and my co-workers are my friends and now they are my family."

Tom King never dreamed that becoming a part of Land of Lincoln Goodwill would change his life.

But it did.





As a former Navy veteran, Tom found himself in a downward spiral of alcohol addiction at the age of 45. His addiction had emptied his drive to achieve, caused a sporadic work history, and disrupted his family life. Tom sought help from family and soon entered a 12-step program to help him deal with his illness. After completing that program he began searching for employment, but because of his past and the large gaps in his work history, he found future employment prospects sketchy at best. "I saw the Land of Lincoln Goodwill was hiring truck drivers, so I took a shot and submitted my application," said Tom. Eventually, Tom was called for an interview with Goodwill and when asked about his many gaps in his employment history, Tom took a chance and told the truth. Goodwill decided to take a chance on Tom and offered him the position he was seeking. It wasn't long before Tom's determination, work ethic and passion for the Goodwill mission elevated him to a permanent position as the Director of Logistics and Transportation. "Never, in my wildest dreams, did I ever think I would have a position like this," says Tom. "I can't imagine what my life would be without Goodwill and I don't know where I would be."
